

We would like to present the 2015 Annual Report. This report details many of our department's accomplishments during 2015. Again this year you will find detailed information that helps illustrate some of the great things our officers are doing as they continue to have the privilege to serve the citizens of Loves Park.

This year's successes include a substantial increase in DUI arrests. We may not be able to predict what tragedies were stopped by our officers' enforcements, but we do know that taking an intoxicated driver off of the street can only make our roads safer.

Some of the accomplishments this year include streamlining the towing process. This new process has ultimately allowed our officers to remain on the streets longer and allowed them to continue traffic enforcement. We have seen an increase of 36.65% in traffic contacts, relative to 2014.

We have also continued our commitment to regional policing efforts by becoming charter members of the new FBI Safe Streets Task Force. This gives our officers new resources in the fight against violent crime. We have also continued to work with the Winnebago County Sheriff's Departments Saturation Patrols.

2015 also brought mandates at the State level that have allowed us to implement new programs. This includes the new stop card receipt program and moving forward with a viable body camera program. This past year we implemented a trial period with body cameras. We will use this period to implement the best, cost-effective program to satisfy the new state mandate.

Thank you again for taking the time to preview our annual report. We encourage each of you to contact us with any questions you may have. We are looking forward to a great year in which we do our part to continue to make Loves Park a great place to live.




# 2015 Organizational Chart



This is the most current organizational chart, for the Loves Park Police Department. The only change made in 2015 was the hiring of one officer to get all patrol shifts to equal staffing levels.

## 2014 to 2015 Part I Offenses Comparison

#### 2014 to 2015 PART I OFFENSES COMPARISON



There was a total of 697 Part I Offenses, in 2015. This is a 19.8% increase over 2014. The highest category, at 478 offenses, is theft., which includes things like gasoline drive-offs.

Every month, nearly 18,000 city, county, state, federal, tribal, and university law enforcement agencies report crimes brought to their attention to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The official data on crime is compiled into what is known as the Uniform Crime Reports (UCR).

Part I crimes are broken down into two categories, violent crime and property crime. The violent crime offenses that are reported include aggravated assault, forcible rape, murder, robbery, and human trafficking. The property crimes reported are arson, burglary, theft, and motor vehicle theft.

# Total Arrests

1308 total arrests in 2015. These are for all criminal violations of statute and ordinance. There was a 6.30% decrease in arrests from 2014.

# Total Citations

11,548 total citations and warnings issued in 2015. This is a 36.65% increase in traffic contacts from 2014. These are for various violations of traffic law.


# Total Crashes

736 total traffic crashes in 2015. These include all property damage, personal injury, and fatal crashes. There was a 4.54% decrease in crashes from 2014.

2015 Calls for Service by Month




The graph above represents calls for service by month of the year. Calls topped their highest mark in the month of September. These calls for service also include self-initiated activity by the officers.

2015 Calls for Service by Day of the Week




The graph above represents calls for service by day of the week. Calls for service are the heaviest on Fridays. The second highest day is Tuesdays and then followed by Wednesdays.

#### 26,467 Total Call for Service


2015 Calls for Service by Hour of Occurrence


#### 2015 DUI Arrests by Officer




Officers made a total of 198


### Traffic Crash Analysis






These two graphs show a detailed breakdown of the 736 total traffic crashes for 2015.

The chart above shows crashes by month and the chart below shows crashes by day of the week. There were zero fatal crashes in 2015.




### Traffic Crash Analysis



The chart above lists the intersections in Loves Park with the highest frequency of crashes. As shown, the intersection of N. Perryville Rd. and Harlem Rd. is the highest location of crashes, at 45 for calendar year 2015. We did have a 4.54% reduction in crashes from 2014, from 771 to 736.



On 05/01/2015, Sergeant Doug Allton retired after 32 years of service to the City. He spent the last 16 years as a patrol sergeant. Prior to being promoted, Doug was a patrol officer and acting shift commander. He was also responsible for the managing the fleet of vehicles. Doug was elected to City Council in April 2015, and took office just after retiring from the Police Department.

## **Promotions in 2015**





In May 2015, Mike Landman was promoted to the rank of Sergeant, to replace retiring Sergeant Doug Allton. Sergeant Landman has served as a patrol officer, acting shift commander, and narcotics investigator. He is currently assigned to night shift patrol.

## Patrol Division



The Loves Park Police Department Patrol Division is comprised of 24 Officers and Sergeants. The job description of a patrol officer is as follows:

A patrol officer must possess knowledge of modern law enforcement principles, procedures, techniques, equipment, and possess a working knowledge of city ordinances, federal and state statutes, department policy and procedures, rules, regulations, and court opinions with emphasis on criminal law, search, seizure, and arrest. They must also possess interpersonal, verbal, and written communications skills and exercise sound judgment in evaluating situations and in decision making.

The patrol function is the backbone of every police department. They are the officers on the street which interact with the public, on a daily basis. The Patrol Officers of this department represent the City of Loves Park extremely well. Their calls for service and traffic contacts both were at a significant increase over the previous year.

## Detective Bureau

The Detective Bureau is responsible for the investigation of cases that go beyond what the normal patrol officer is able to complete. In 2015, one detective was assigned full time to the FBI Safe Streets Task Force. This increased the case load for the other 3 detectives, so a patrol officer from each of the 4 shifts was assigned as a liaison to assist with certain cases. The detectives work cases involving misdemeanor and felony charges, as well as completing all background investigations for new hires. In addition, the detective bureau is responsible for approximately 52 registered sex offenders living in the city. # School Resource Officer School Resource Officer

Officer Jerry Guetschow is assigned to Harlem Middle School, through a memorandum of understanding, that was drafted between the City of Loves Park and the Harlem School District. Through this agreement, the school district reimburses 75% of his salary. The agreement automatically renews each year, unless either side would like to make an amendment to the agreement. Jerry patrols the halls of the school, and the school grounds, on a daily basis during the school year. In the summer he works as a special enforcement traffic unit, he takes one week of the summer to teach Youth Police Academy, and he also plans and organizes our National Night Out Event. Jerry was selected to the office of treasurer, on the Illinois School Resource Officers Association Board, as well as being a member of the National Association.

The Police Department made one major upgrade in 2015, of a full parking lot and sidewalks. We planned the project for several months and contracted the work to the lowest responsible bidder, through City Council resolution. Everything was completed in October and the results were an amazing transformation for the department. Thank you to City Hall Staff and City Council for supporting this major project.

# 2015 Upgrades and Changes









During calendar year 2015, the Police Department saw technology upgrades to help officers work more effective and efficient. They were provided two new Panasonic Toughbook laptop computers, by resolution through City Council. The department purchased 12 new Taser weapons to replace an out of date and no longer supported older model. We entered into a towing and impoundment agreement with A to Z Towing to streamline the admin and towing process for the entire department. Lastly, the City made a major phone upgrade and all the Police Department telephones were replaced.

## Intranet Site - Ippdweb



The department continues to regularly update the intranet site, located at lppdweb. New to the site in 2015 were things like search capabilities, monthly dashboards, special school patrols, traffic court and admin court calendars, several forms, and current law books. The site constantly has new information added and can be fine-tuned to fit the officers needs. Almost all changes made to the site are by recommendation by the officers using it.

## **NetDutyOnline - Scheduling Software**



In October of 2014, we implemented a new scheduling software, at the police department. Since that time, the time off request process has gone completely paperless. Officers are able to submit their requests and supervisors may approve them all online. Also, officers and supervisors are notified by email and/or text message of the requests and approves, so they are getting real time updates. Employees are able to access their time off banks and other information from anywhere they have internet connection. We continue to look to add more uses of this software as we move forward.

#### Loves Park Police App.

Look for the launch of a police department app in the near future. The Apple App Store version was just completed and is in testing stage before being launched to the public.



#### **Body Cameras**

The department is in the process of building a squad camera and body camera project, with Taser International, who has become the lead in both of these technologies.

#### **Electronic Ticketing**

We are now partnering with Rockford Police, Winnebago County Sheriffs Office, and the Winnebago County Clerk's Office to get this program purchased and installed in our squad laptops.
